



Apache Leap Special Management Area



What is the Apache Leap Special Management Area?

 An area designated by Congress – in Section 3003 NDAA (National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2015)

□ Total Area of 807 acres:
Tonto National Forest ≈ 697 acres
Resolution Copper ≈ 110 acres



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Purpose(s)

- To preserve the natural character of Apache Leap
- To allow for traditional uses of the area by Native American people
- To protect & conserve the cultural and archeological resources of the area



PL 113-291 NDAA Section 3003 (g)(2)(A,B,C)



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Authorized Activities

Installation of seismic monitoring equipment on the surface and subsurface (to protect resources located within Apache Leap SMA)

Installation of fences, signs, or other measures necessary (to protect the health and safety of the public)


Operation of an underground tunnel and associated workings (as described in Resolution Copper's General Plan of Operations, subject to any terms and conditions the Secretary of Agriculture may reasonably require)



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Consider ... whether additional measures are needed to:

- Protect the cultural, archeological, or historical resources of Apache Leap
- Provide access for recreation






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Prepare a management plan...

- In consultation with affected Indian tribes, the Town of Superior, Resolution Copper, & interested public
- Not later than 3 years after enactment of the NDAA (12/2014)






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
What did we hear from stakeholders?



- Preserve the area's natural beauty
- Respect/protect cultural resources
- Continue all current uses of area
- Allow rock climbing, hiking, mountain biking, hunting
- No new motorized uses
- Monitor uses & resource impacts
- Limit future development keep natural character intact
- More access on west side; loss of east side access due to proposed mine

Current Management Direction



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The proposed management plan establishes a broad framework for managing the natural character and values of the area.





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What's included in the proposed plan?

Plan Component	Purpose	
Desired Conditions	Describe how the plan area should look in the future	
Objectives	Actions to achieve measurable progress toward a desired condition(s)	
Standards/ Guidelines	Constraints on project and activity decision-making to help achieve desired conditions, avoid or mitigate undesirable effects, or to meet applicable legal requirements	
Management Approaches	Describes management intent, possible management strategies, potential partnership opportunities & coordination activities, including area or resource monitoring	
Land Suitability	Areas identified as suitable/not suitable for certain uses or activities based on desired conditions	



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Cultural/Historic Resources

CURRENT MANAGEMENT	PROPOSED MANAGEMENT	
	Continues current management direction along with:	
Resources managed consistent with various laws, regulations and policies.	Additional emphasis given to identifying & nominating cultural resources eligible for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places	
	Seeks input from Tribes for maintaining archaeological sites,	
	traditional use areas, and natural resources	



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Natural Character & Scenery

CURRENT MANAGEMENT	PROPOSED MANAGEMENT	
Manage for some areas to appear natural and some areas to have significant deviations	Manage so the landscape appears natural with limited deviations	
Construction of new communications	Construction of new communications	
sites, utility lines, transmission lines	sites, utility lines, transmission lines	
is allowed	should not occur	
No seismic monitoring in place	Monitor for potential seismic impacts of proposed adjacent mining site	



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Public Access & Recreation

CURRENT MANAGEMENT

PROPOSED MANAGEMENT

Roads & trails follow current Forest Service designations

Opportunities for dispersed recreation are available to the public

Manage for mix of 'Urban', 'Roaded	Manage for 'Semi-Primitive Non-	
Natural' and 'Semi-Primitive	motorized' to protect natural	
Motorized' levels on the recreation	character and values while allowing	
opportunity spectrum	for recreational use	
Overnight camping is allowed	Overnight camping is prohibited	



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Mineral Resources

CURRENT MANAGEMENT	PROPOSED MANAGEMENT	
Area is open to mineral exploration and development	Area is withdrawn from mineral exploration and development; mining is not permitted	
Abandoned mining infrastructure poses public safety hazard	Public safety hazards are mitigated within 5 years of detection	



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Livestock Grazing

CURRENT MANAGEMENT	PROPOSED MANAGEMENT	
Grazing continues on Devil's Canyon allotment		
Grazing occurs on Superior allotment	Grazing removed from Superior allotment	



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Wildlife, Vegetation, Wildland Fire

CURRENT MANAGEMENT

PROPOSED MANAGEMENT

Manage to provide habitat for various animal species (wildlife)


Manage to promote natural ecological processes and limit undesirable nonnative plant species (vegetation)

Manage to protect human life, property, and natural and cultural resources Manage to sustain resources and natural ecological function (wildland fire)

Consult with affected Indian tribes, the Town of Superior, interested members of the public, and Resolution Copper for input on plan development	September 2016 – January 2017
Prepare Management Plan	Jan – March 2017
Public Comment Period on Management Plan Scoping for Environmental Assessment	March - April 2017
Prepare Environmental Assessment	April – June 2017
Hear and Resolve Objections	July – Nov 2017
Issue Decision Notice	December 2017
